## **JP Gough's legendary UPU collection: a milestone in the world of philately**

Jamie is one of the most-followed individuals in the philatelic community, across disciplines, leveraging his appeal as one of the most influential collectors, exhibitors, judges, writers and presenters. His long career as a competitive exhibitor since 1966, along with his public oratory have built his worldwide reputation and created a strong following among philatelists. Now that Jamie has decided to sell his 'UPU' collection, he has chosen a concept jointly with Heinrich Köhler in Germany and Corinphila in Switzerland.

## **Die legendäre UPU-Sammlung von JP Gough: Ein Meilenstein im Philatelie-Universum**

*Jamie Gough ist eine Ikone in der Welt der Philatelie. Wenn es um das Sammeln, Ausstellen, Bewerten, Schreiben und Moderieren geht, sucht man seinesgleichen. Sein Ruf ist nicht nur exzellent, sondern auch global, aufgebaut durch eine beeindruckende Ausstellerkarriere, die bereits 1966 ihren Anfang nahm, und durch seine einzigartigen rhetorischen Fähigkeiten. Nun hat Jamie eine bahnbrechende Entscheidung getroffen: Er verkauft seine „UPU“-Sammlung und vertraut dabei auf die Expertise von Heinrich Köhler in Deutschland und Corinphila in der Schweiz.*

Für uns gehören diese Beiträge zu den wichtigsten Veröffentlichungen über Tendenzen im Ausstellungswesen über mehrerer Jahrzehnte und die zugrunde liegenden Philosophien – inklusive ihrer, wie er selbst betont, manchmal unbeabsichtigten Folgen.*

Jamie's two Philatelic Summit Papers have become legendary thanks to him sharing his experiences as well as his thoughts and experiences about the evolution of philatelic exhibiting. We claim that Jamie's two papers are among the most important in regard of exhibiting, its trends over a few decades and its underlying philosophies (which sometimes create unintended consequences as he points out).

As one of philately's most notable influencers of our time, Jamie has accumulated three USA national titles (including the National Youth Champion). And while for many philatelists, winning an international Large Gold medal is a lifetime achievement, Jamie has won more than 10 Large Gold medals and four International Grand Prix's.

In the philatelic summit series, Jamie's two contributions are legendary and sought after publications: #1 (2012) with the title *The Ever-Changing Paradigm of Philatelic Exhibiting* and #5 (2014) with the title *Perspectives on Exhibiting (Generally)*.

Jamie won his second USA Championship at Stampshow Champions of Champion, Milwaukee, in 2013. Being presented the trophy by two APS Presidents: Stephen Reinhard and Wade Saadi RDP.

Almost all of Jamie's collecting has taken a "first time, pioneering approach" to philatelic exhibiting based on broad themes. We can make that statement even as far back as his Irish Postal History, 1690-1926. When he started his Irish postal history collection, philately generally accepted that postal history was stampless material with manuscript markings or handstamps. But Jamie included distinctive Irish cancellations on GB stamps right into the independence movement (1916-1921) and the first stamps of Ireland. He

was actually criticized for doing that because this range included prestamp, as well as stamps and then proofs and mint stamps of the early Irish independence period - all part of the country's story.

Then came postage due stamps of the world on cover. Jamie was told that doing the world was not possible in ten frames (or eight). But he developed the different postal history reasons for postage due as the exhibit's structure. And that made the worldwide approach intellectually acceptable.

Then came Jamie's UPU collection along the lines of UPU rules, regulations and rates. Again, he was told that worldwide was not possible until the establishment found that his items were all "eye candy" and it became acceptable as the intellectual structure became understood.

Jamie always had to break down resistance to non-traditional approaches through persistence and the selective use of beautiful material while avoiding even close duplication.

We were very proud to publish the 79th EDITION D'OR volume, honouring Jamie and his World Champion exhibit Universal Postal Union ("UPU")

auf britischen Briefmarken bis hin zur Unabhängigkeitsbewegung (1916–1921) und den ersten Briefmarken Irlands mit ein. Dafür wurde er anfangs sogar kritisiert, denn dieser Bereich umfasste sowohl Vorphilatelie als auch die Briefmarkenzeit und später Probedrucke sowie postfrische Briefmarken aus der frühen irischen Unabhängigkeitsphase – allesamt Teil der Geschichte des Landes.

Ein ähnliches Erlebnis hatte er mit seiner Sammlung "Portomarken aus aller Welt auf Briefen". Jamie wurde suggeriert, es sei unmöglich, die ganze Welt in zehn (oder acht) Rahmen unterzubringen. Doch er demonstrierte verschiedene postgeschichtliche Gründe für Portomarken als Ausstellungsstruktur. Damit wurde der weltweite Ansatz intellektuell akzeptabel.

Als drittes folgte Jamies UPU-Sammlung, die auf den Regeln, Vorschriften und Tarifen des Weltpostvereins (UPU) aufbaute. Auch hier wurde ihm gesagt, dass eine weltweite Darstellung nicht möglich sei – bis das Establishment feststellte, dass seine Exponate "eine Augenweide" waren und als intellektuelle Struktur akzeptiert wurden.

And Its Impact on Global Postal Services. EDITION D'OR is a series of books presenting the most beautiful Stamp Collections in the world of its time. The series was inaugurated in 2006 and has now reached its state as The Hall of Fame for the best philatelic collections. This is a comprehensive book with 290 pages from Jamie's collection depicted.

In numerous presentations to philatelic communities, Jamie frequently reverts to one and the same statement. Beauty is a quote to use from Jamie in regard of his selection of items of mail. Beauty and outstanding condition is reflected throughout the collection.





Januar 1883 dem Weltpostvertrag über Postkarten mit Antwort bei und zum anderen war der Tarif von 3 Pfg falsch, da der deutsche UPU-Postkartentarif 10 Pfg betrug. Dies ist die erste "Antwortkarte", an jeden beliebigen Bestimmungsort in der Welt, die von der britischen Post anerkannt wurde.

# THE EXTRAORDINARY CHARM OF PHILATELY

**Globally networked  
150 years of the Universal Postal Union**

In 1874, the postal administrations of 20 countries founded the General Postal Union (GPU) to make it easier to send mail across borders. Renamed the Universal Postal Union (UPU) in 1878, the institution began its pioneering work 150 years ago on 1 July 1875, making it one of the oldest organisations in the world. To this day, its task is to mediate between the interests of its member countries and thus promote global postal traffic. Join us on a journey back in time to the second half of the 19<sup>th</sup> century and get to know two geniuses of postal history and philately - Heinrich Stephan (1831-1897), from 1885 von Stephan, Postmaster General of the German Empire and a key co-initiator of the Universal Postal Union, and James Peter Gough, a first-class philatelist and one of the most important philatelic researchers on the history of globally regulated postal exchange. Thanks to the Universal Postal Union, today you can simply drop a letter franked with a stamp in your home country's letterbox and it will reach the recipient on the other side of the world in a relatively short time. More than 150 years ago, things were very different. In the middle of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, industrialization led to an enormous growth in international trade and with it a massive increase in the need for cross-border communication. As a result, there were soon hundreds of highly complex bilateral agreements between the postal administrations of numerous countries. In simple terms, this is what it looked like in practice: At the border, the mail item was handed over to the postal organization of the neighbouring country, which was responsible for its further transport. In return, the postal administration of the sender country had to pay an individually agreed fee to this organization. There were also regulations and remunerations for possible transit through other countries.

Heinrich Stephan (1831 to 1897) was Postmaster General of the North German Confederation from 1 May 1870 and later Postmaster General of the German Empire. The Universal Postal Union was founded on his tireless initiative.



## **The first remedy was provided by the German-Austrian Postal Union**

Let's just look at the German lands: until the middle of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century, Germany consisted of many kingdoms, principalities, free and Hanseatic cities and counties – numerous states, each with its own postal administration with individual rules for postal transport and the associated fees. The first remedy was provided by the German-Austrian Postal Union, which began its work on 1 July 1850. Its purpose was the 'regulation of uniform valuations and postal treatment of letter and carriage mail items'. Prussia and Austria were in charge of the organization.

Speaking of 'Prussia': two years before the German-Austrian Postal Union, a man joined the postal service of the Kingdom of Prussia whose services to the international postal system cannot be overestimated. We are, of course, talking about Ernst Heinrich Wilhelm Stephan. Born on 7 January 1831 in Stolp in Pomerania (now Poland), he began his exemplary career in 1848, which ultimately led him to the General Post Office in Berlin. One of his first tasks there was to draw up a parcel post tariff for the territory of the German-Austrian Postal Union. In September 1858, he completed his comprehensive work 'Die Geschichte der Preußischen Post von ihrem Ursprung bis auf die Gegenwart' (The History of the Prussian Post Office from its Origins to the Present Day), which not only describes the postal history of Prussia, but also the entire postal development in Europe. His ingenious understanding of entrepreneurial interrelationships and his pronounced diplomatic skills ensured that he was entrusted with important reform tasks. From the early 1860s, for example, he negotiated postal treaties with Belgium, Italy, the Netherlands, Portugal, Switzerland, Spain and the United States of America at the Berlin General Post Office.

### **Simple and cost-effective: a pioneering innovation in the postal sector**

In 1865, Heinrich Stephan took the initiative for a ground-breaking innovation in the postal service. This was nothing less than the introduction of the postcard. At the fifth conference of the German-Austrian Postal Association (November 1865 to March 1866), Stephan presented a concept for a so-called 'open postcard', which was intended to be a simple and inexpensive alternative to sending letters. 'The institution should be welcome to the public for many occasions and circumstances, especially if the initial shyness about open communications is overcome on closer inspection of the matter,' said Stephan in his memorandum. However, many participants at the conference did not see it that way. This also applied to the Prussian Director General at the time, Karl Ludwig Richard von Philipsborn. He saw both the secrecy of correspondence and the preservation of good morals at risk and rejected the 'indecent form of communication on an open postal sheet'. After von Philipsborn voluntarily resigned from his post, Heinrich Stephan became General Postal Director of the North German Confederation on 1 May 1870 – Prussia no longer had independent postal sovereignty – and finally introduced his 'Postblatt' under the name 'Correspondenz-Karte' (correspondence card). Prior to this, on 1 October 1869, the Austrian postal service had already launched cards of the same name on the market, even with a stamp imprint, making them the first postal stationery postcards in the world. Both in Austria and in the North German Confederation, these were extremely popular with the public right from the start. Heinrich Stephan was therefore absolutely right with his assessment from 1865.

## Global postal co-operation

The same applies to his most significant achievement by far - the conclusion of a single postal treaty valid for as many countries in the world as possible. Here too, the genius was ahead of his time when he submitted this proposal to the Berlin General Post Office as early as 1868. Once again, he was initially thwarted by his superiors. Six years later, the time had finally come: with negotiating skills par excellence, Heinrich Stephan succeeded in bringing together delegations from numerous countries in Bern City Hall on 15 September 1874 to negotiate a 'General Postal Treaty' and ultimately founded a General Postal Union. The treaty was signed on 9 October 1874. The 20 founding members included Germany, Austria-Hungary, Belgium, Denmark, Spain, Great Britain, Greece, Italy, Luxembourg, Norway, the Netherlands, Portugal, Romania, Russia, Serbia, Sweden, Switzerland and Turkey, a total of 18 European countries as well as Egypt and the United States of America. The Universal Postal Convention came into force on 1 July 1875. From then on, each postal administration of the newly founded GPU kept the proceeds of the postage in full and there were no more mutual settlements. The costs of delivering mail from other countries were to be offset by the charges in the opposite direction. France joined the agreement on 1 January 1876 and Japan in July 1879.

## The greatest rarities in global postal history

Keyword 'Universal Postal Congress': Between 1874 and 1891, a total of four congresses and two special conferences were held. Reality showed that numerous exceptions, surcharges and transit agreements initially created a complex network of rates and routes that ran counter to the Universal Postal Union's actual aim of simplifying postal relations between countries. However, many special regulations for letters, printed matter, postcards or parcels were very short-lived. Particularly exciting for philatelists: the result was items that are among the greatest rarities in global postal history. The absolute expert on this subject is James Peter Gough - friends call him Jamie. Over more than four decades, the American with Irish roots has built up by far the most important philatelic collection on the history of the Universal Postal Union in the 19<sup>th</sup> century - a great selection that Heinrich Stephan made possible through his initiatives and measures. Included in Jamie Gough's collection are phenomenal rarities from the period before the founding of the Universal Postal Union, which symbolize in a unique way the postal concepts and services for the newly created unified postal area that were discussed during the first Universal Postal Congresses. Like Heinrich Stephan, Jamie Gough is characterized by his impressive expertise - numerous prizes for his outstanding exhibition collections and top honors such as the signing of the 'Roll of Distinguished Philatelists' in 2012 speak for themselves. In addition, like the legendary organizer of the postal system, Jamie Gough also created standard reference works on postal history. One example of this is his two-volume book, "The Postal History of the Universal Postal Union, The Postal Card Worldwide 1869-1974", published in 2020 by the renowned Royal Philatelic Society.

Last but not least, the news of the day: Jamie Gough has decided to share his enthusiasm for the exciting history of the Universal Postal Union with as many other philatelists as possible. For this reason, the auction houses Heinrich Köhler and Corinphila have been authorized to bring his top collection 'Universal Postal Union and its Impact on Global Postal Services' back into the philatelic cycle. The auctions in Wiesbaden in September and Zurich in November guarantee postal history at its finest. The history, the product and the people: these are the indispensable ingredients for the **Extraordinary Charm of Philately!**





#### FDC North German Postal Union.

In the German War of 1866, Prussia fought against Austria for supremacy in the German Confederation. Austria was defeated and agreed to the dissolution of the German Confederation and the reorganization of Germany without its own participation. Consequently, the North German Confederation was founded in 1866/67 under the leadership of Prussia. It issued its first stamps on 1 January 1868, which were valid for the entire territory of the North German Postal Union, but also for destinations outside the North German postal district. Harmonized fees and stamps were the ideal of a uniform postal area, which the Universal Postal Union never achieved. This wonderful first day cover of the North German postal district from Jamie Gough's collection is one of the most important rarities in past German States philately.

#### Pre-First Day formula card

On 1 July 1870, the North German Postal Union issued the first 'Correspondence cards'. These were delivered to post office counters a few days earlier. Delivery to the public before 1 July was against the regulations. Nevertheless, earlier sales happened in a few rare cases. The earliest known use - 23 June 1870 - is shown on this formula card from Stettin to Vienna from the collection of Jamie Gough. At the time the Universal Postal Union was founded, not all founding members had yet issued postal cards. However, the concept of this simple and inexpensive alternative to letters was discussed early on and gradually implemented.

These Réclamation inquiries are the rarest of UPU forms since they were returned to the country of issue (with explanation from each of the transit points to destination), where destroyed normally one year after return.
